*Consistory of December 14, 1974*

LET US REJOICE indeed, Venerable Brothers, because we conclude from the voting that the Heavenly Blesseds under discussion seem to you to be certainly worthy of the honors reserved for sanctity. Our own opinion wholeheartedly concurs.

And since everything demanded in these causes has been duly carried out, We proclaim and We decree that, with God's help, the proper solemn ceremonies be celebrated in the Vatican Basilica during the Holy Year. It is likewise fitting to assign dates for these solemnities at this time. We assign for inclusion in the catalog of Saints in Heaven . . . Blessed Elizabeth Ann, Widow Seton, on the fourteenth day of the month of September. . .



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## PRESENT INFORMATION ON CANONIZATION

THE CANONIZATION ceremonies for Blessed Elizabeth Seton are taking firm shape. As this issue of *The Seton Causeway* goes to press the following information is available from the Office of the Postulator General, Father Lucio Lapalorcia, C.M., in Rome, and the Office of the Vice Postulator, Father Sylvester A. Taggart, C.M., in Emmitsburg, Md.

### Canonization

His Holiness, Pope Paul VI, will celebrate the canonization Mass during which he will perform the rite of canonization in St. Peter's Basilica, Rome, on Sunday, September 14, 1975

at 9 or 9:30 A.M.

### Audience

It is hoped that the Holy Father will grant a public audience to the canonization pilgrims on Wednesday, September 17, probably around 6 P.M. in the Piazza of St. Peter's, although this is not certain at this point.

### Triduum

The traditional triduum of Masses in honor of the new saint will be celebrated in the Basilica of St. Paul outside-the-walls on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, September 16, 17 and 18.

### Attire

In answer to inquiries, it has been ascertained that pants suits will be acceptable wear for women at the canonization ceremony as well as the triduum of Masses. Head coverings for women are optional.

### Secretariate

As of May 23, a Secretariate for the Canonization of Mother Seton has been set up in Rome for the distribution of tickets to the canonization ceremonies. Anyone desiring tickets should write to:

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## Seton Notes

THE SISTERS OF CHARITY OF NEW YORK, through their 41-member Assembly reelected Sister Margaret Dowling to a second four-year term as president of the Community. From a slate nominated by the entire Community the Assembly also chose six regional coordinators and confirmed the appointment of two executive assistants. These nine Sisters will form the executive council, the top administrative body.

The executive assistants reappointed by Sister Margaret are Sister Teresita Regina Austin and Sister Mary Elizabeth Earley.

The regional coordinators are Sisters Virginia Unsworth, Agnes Connolly, Maria Assumpta Azevedo, Catherine Hunt, Dolorita Maria Donachie and Florence Speth.



THE BI-MONTHLY PUBLICATION *Loreto* for January-February 1975 carried an article entitled *Elizabeth A. Seton*, and subtitled, "A Call to Sainthood for a Debutante of New York—The First Saint of the U.S.A." by Sister William Loretta. The article was illustrated by a detail from a stained glass window in the American chapel of the Holy House of Loreto, Italy, depicting Mother Seton as a religious with the halo of the Blessed. The artist is J. Stefanina.



MOTHER MARGARET HALL, the villa for the old and the sick at the motherhouse of the Sisters of Charity of Cincinnati, has broadened its admission policy to include, besides Sisters of the Community: female relatives of the Sisters (the interpretation of the term "relative" is to be taken broadly), Sisters of other congregations to whom nursing home services are unavailable, female employees and relatives of employees of Sisters of Charity institutions, and female relatives of priests.



THE BANK OF NEW YORK'S monthly staff publication for January 1975 featured a startling cover for a business paper, with a 5" x 11" reproduction of a statue of Blessed Elizabeth Ann Seton and the bold headline, "Mother Seton—America's First Saint had Close Relationship with the Bank of New York—Husband was Bank Director, Father-in-law First Cashier." A lengthy and detailed article, profusely illustrated, covers three pages of the eight-page paper.

The elder William Seton served as cashier of the Bank, founded by Alexander Hamilton in 1784 and including among its charter directors Isaac Roosevelt and John Vanderbilt, until 1794 when he became a director until his death in 1798. The article also states that William Magee Seton, Elizabeth Ann Seton's husband, was a director of the Bank in 1798, and that at the time of the Bank's incorporation in 1791, "William Seton & Co." is listed among the stockholders.



THE SISTERS OF THE BLESSED SACRAMENT, in the pages of their quarterly publication to advance the cause of their foundress, *The Mother Katherine Drexel Guild News Bulletin*, for

Spring 1975, express their "rejoicing with the Sisters of Charity throughout the world and with the many devoted friends of Blessed Elizabeth Seton" over her coming canonization. The issue, which features pictures of Blessed Elizabeth Ann and Mother Katherine on its cover, stresses the similarities of the two holy women, especially their devotion to the Church.

On November 9, 1973 the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament were notified by Rev. Nicola Ferrante, C.S.S.R., postulator for Mother Katherine's cause, that the Sacred Congregation for the Causes of Saints had cleared the writings of the foundress.



SISTER GRACE MARIE HILTZ, S.C., president of Good Samaritan Hospital, Cincinnati, has been named to the board of directors of the St. Louis-based Pope John XXIII Medical Moral Research and Education Center. Sponsored by the Catholic Hospital Association, the research center functions on a national level to identify long-range medical moral issues and concerns that require the application of theological and moral principles in health care. Sister Grace Marie has been associated with the CHA since 1966 and currently serves as chairman of the board of trustees.



REGION IV of the Leadership Conference of Women Religious has adopted a resolution on the occasion of the announcement of the canonization of Elizabeth Seton. It reads in part: "We join the Sisters of Charity on the occasion of the canonization of Mother Elizabeth Seton in honoring her who is God's daughter and friend. We offer our congratulations to the Sisters of Charity and particularly to Sister Mary Assunta Stang, a member of Region IV of the Leadership Conference of Women Religious. May this great event in their Community evidence to the pilgrim people once more that love is the greatest gift of all and in her expression of it Mother Seton resembles Him whom she loves—eternally."



DORIS REVERE PETERS, who has long written the "Women" page in the official Knights of Columbus monthly magazine, *Columbia*, devoted her March and April 1975 contributions to Blessed Elizabeth Ann Seton. Her first article, entitled *What does Mother Seton say to modern women*, sketched the Blessed's life as an example for the inspiration of women today. Her second article, entitled *What legacy did Mother Seton leave America*, recounted the history of the apostolic works of the Blessed's religious daughters. The article ends thus: "At a meeting of the American hierarchy in 1852 Archbishop Francis Patrick Kenrick commented: 'Elizabeth Seton did more for the Church in America than all of us bishops together.'"



THE DIOCESAN COUNCIL OF CATHOLIC WOMEN of the Diocese of St. Augustine, invited Father Joseph I. Dirvin, C.M., editor of *The Seton Causeway* and author of *Mrs. Seton*, to address its annual convention held at the Turtle Inn, Jacksonville, Fla., on April 28, 1975. At the convention Sister Catherine, D.C., administrator of St. Vincent's Medical Center, Jacksonville, received from the

Diocesan Council a special surprise award for "her unselfish dedication to pro-life causes."

Following his talk Father Dirvin was interviewed by Elaine Kent, staff writer for *The Florida Times Union* of Jacksonville.

Father Dirvin has also lectured recently on Mother Seton at her shrine on State St. in New York City; and to the Hudson Council, Woodside, Queens, of the Knights of Columbus; the Altar and Rosary Society of St. Charles Church, Staten Island; and at the commencement exercises of St. Joseph's College, Princeton, N. J.



SISTER LUDMILLA HARTMAN of the Sisters of Charity of Cincinnati was presented with the 1975 Senior Citizens Hall of Fame Award by the Cincinnati Recreation Commission and the City of Cincinnati at a special ceremony on May 1. Sister Ludmilla was cited in recognition of her "continuing contributions to the life of the Cincinnati community during retirement."



THE CATHOLIC DIGEST BOOK CLUB has chosen the New Canonization Edition of *Mrs. Seton, Foundress of the American Sisters of Charity* by Joseph I. Dirvin, C.M., as its June 1975 selection.



SISTER MARY BASIL ROARKE, Visitatrix of the Northeast Province of the Daughters of Charity, was awarded an honorary doctorate by Niagara University at the annual commencement on May 25.



SISTER LORETTO BERNARD, S.C., treasurer of The Saint Vincent's Medical Center of Richmond, Staten Island, and Father Joseph I. Dirvin, C.M., vice president for university relations and secretary, St. John's University, N. Y., are serving on the 20-member Cardinal's Task Force for Health of the Archdiocese of New York.



THE EMMITSBURG COMMUNITY CHORUS, which consists of Daughters of Charity and Catholic and Protestant laity of the area, has been invited by Vatican officials to sing at the canonization of Blessed Elizabeth Ann Seton in Rome. The Chorus, which is directed by Sister Jane Marie Perrot, D.C., will thus join the prestigious Sistine Choir in providing the music of the Mass. The papal choir will sing the major portions of the Mass; the Emmitsburg chorus will be heard in a half-hour concert before Mass, at Communion time and at the end. Texts of congregational songs will be incorporated in the day's liturgical booklet so that the entire congregation may join the Chorus at stated times.



CATHOLIC DAUGHTERS OF AMERICA from 25 Maryland courts of the society recently made a pilgrimage to Emmitsburg in thanksgiving for their 60 years of existence in the State. The 1,000 members and friends were led by State Regent Eva Barczak. The pilgrimage began at the shrine grotto of Our Lady of Lourdes with a Mass celebrated by Father Henry Hughes and concelebrated by Fathers Francis Childress and James Dowdy. Following the Mass the pilgrims made a tour of the Seton shrines.

AT EMMITSBURG

CANONIZATION DAY for Blessed Mother Seton, September 14, 1975, will be celebrated at Emmitsburg with six Eucharistic liturgies. Sister Mary Clare Hughes, Visitatrix of the Southeast Province of the Daughters of Charity, announced the day-long celebration as fulfilling "the desires of our Sisters at Emmitsburg to share the momentous occasion with the American people."

The Masses will be held in the chapel of St. Joseph's Provincial House where Mother Seton's remains are enshrined, every two hours beginning at 9 A.M. and continuing at 11 A.M., 1, 3, 5 and 7 P.M. Individual veneration of the new saint's relic will take place after each Mass.

All the Masses are open to the public. No admission tickets are required.

Priests wishing to concelebrate are asked to write beforehand to: The Planning Committee, St. Joseph's Provincial House, Emmitsburg, Md. 21727. They should indicate the time of the Mass of their choice.

Seton Guild Plans Canonization Trip

THE MOTHER SETON GUILD, the official arm of the Seton cause in the United States with Father Sylvester A. Taggart, C.M., vice postulator, at its head, is sponsoring a nationwide pilgrimage to Rome for Mother Seton's canonization on September 14, 1975.

The tour is organized for Guild members. One becomes a member by sending the yearly membership fee of \$1.00 to The Mother Seton Guild, Emmitsburg, Md. 21727. Members receive THE SETON CAUSEWAY four times a year.

The Guild has entrusted the pilgrimage to the Connor Travel Agency, Baltimore, Md.

The tour, scheduled for September 11-19, 1975, concentrates on two main items: air transportation and hotel accommodations.

Air transportation will be provided direct from 14 major cities to Rome. The round trip fare is computed according to the city of departure as follows:

Air fare is based on charter flights pro-rating the cost of each seat. Should the plane not be completely sold, the air fare would increase proportionately. Costs may fluctuate slightly—exact prices will be given upon deposit.

Hotel prices are computed per person, double occupancy, 7 nights, according to the class of hotel selected. Prices are as follows: Deluxe hotel—\$257; First class hotel—\$240; and Tourist hotel—\$203.

The tour includes the following: Round trip air transportation and transfers between airport and hotel in Rome.

Hotel accommodations with continental breakfast each day.

Two sightseeing trips in Rome. Transportation to and from St. Peter's.

Round trip to and from one of the titular churches.

New Edition of Seton Biography Now Available

A NEW CANONIZATION EDITION of *Mrs. Seton, Foundress of the American Sisters of Charity* has been published by Farrar, Straus and Giroux, New York.

The special edition, which is the third printing of the work, features a new Foreword by Terence Cardinal Cooke, Archbishop of New York, which not only stresses the importance of Elizabeth Seton for the American Church and individual Catholics and the nation and every American but also provides a history of the process which led to her canonization.

Father Dirvin has written a new Author's Note which includes a description of the three miracles accepted by the Church as worked through her intercession.

The book also carries the official Decree of Pope Paul VI proclaiming Blessed Elizabeth Ann Seton's forthcoming canonization.

In addition there are 455 pages of text, 41 pages of Sources, Bibliography and Index, and 27 illustrations.

According to custom for Vatican events, tickets, although reserved by the Secretariate for those writing, will not be distributed until two or three days before the canonization ceremony.

As we go to press, word has been received of the death of Mother Mary, former Mother General of the Sisters of Mount St. Vincent, New York. We extend sincerest, prayerful sympathy to the Sisters.

Seton Shrine Renovations

THE MOTHER SETON SHRINE in the chapel of the provincial house of the Daughters of Charity at Emmitsburg, Md., is undergoing renovation in view of Blessed Mother Seton's canonization.

The renovation is designed to provide added protection for Blessed Elizabeth Ann's precious remains, and to make it more convenient for pilgrims to pray at the shrine.

Pews have been removed from in front of the shrine to make way for a double priedieu facing it.

The casket reliquary is being enclosed in marble which will bear the inscription: *Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton—Born August 28, 1774—Died January 4, 1821—Venerable December 18, 1959—Blessed March 17, 1963—Saint September 14, 1975.*

On the arch above the shrine the word *Saint* will replace the word *Blessed*. The lighting will also be improved.

Other improvements are being made on the grounds to facilitate the expected influx of visitors during the remainder of 1975 and through 1976, the American Bicentennial Year.

The Dubois building has been designated the Seton Shrine Center. Office space is being assigned and phones installed there. New directional signs are being erected at key points around the grounds.

Extra Sisters will be assigned to the Shrine Center, some for the summer months and others to serve six-month tours of duty.

We are receiving many requests for medals of *Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton*. These new medals will not be available until after August 1, 1975. There will be several different types of medals and at the present time we do not know the cost of these new medals.
